Looking To the Future

Appreciating everyone's busy schedules, I realize that not everyone will be able to make our half day retreat on Saturday, February 3rd. In the last two years, we have made time and space at the start of the year to meet and reflect backward so we can plan forward. As I have thought about the future, here are seven areas I will share on February 3rd that I would suggest we need to pay attention to as a Quaker meeting. *You may have other areas of focus, or you may not agree with all of these, and that's the beauty and challenge of community.* What are our most important areas of focus and what steps do we need to take as a community to move in that direction. *I would welcome your thoughts and input as you reflect on these seven areas. Financial Sustainability – How will High Point Friends remain financially viable over the long term and what steps do we need to take to create a way forward for financial sustainability? How do we faithfully steward the resources we have been given from previous generations?

Facility Flexibility – How can we steward the space and facility so that it serves us as a spiritual community but is also open to other groups and individuals that might benefit from a functional and well managed space? How can our facility and space be an encouragement and resource for others?

Transformational Community – What does it look like for us to intentionally create a culture of spiritual transformation where lives are transformed through both the individual spiritual journey and as part of the community? What does spiritual transformation mean for each of us?

- Mission & Service Partnership How can we partner with other service/mission agencies both locally and globally so that God's love is being made real both in our neighborhood and beyond? What are the tangible resources we can offer in this partnership with others?
- Quaker Witness What does it look like for High Point Friends to bear witness and live faithfully into its Quaker witness? How can we partner with High Point Friends School to promote the SPICES (Simplicity, Peace, Integrity, Community, Equality, Stewardship)
- Holistic Growth How can we encourage and nurture holistic growth for us as individuals and as a faith community? For the individual, it means our emotional life is as important as our spiritual life. For the community, it means we offer ministry for physical needs as well as spiritual needs. What does it look like for us to offer ministry and service for the whole person?
- Leadership Development How can we create a culture of *servant leadership* and what does it mean to be a leader in a Quaker meeting? How do we go about developing and training folks to move into leadership roles within the meeting? How can we make space and create opportunities for new leadership to emerge?

One of the signature practices of Quakers is that of offering queries or questions for reflection and consideration. I have offered these areas in the form of queries as a way for us to reflect on them, pray about them, and have conversations around them. Often our conversations will help to reveal ways of moving forward we can't initially see. Queries also invite us to reflect upon our own role and responsibility in each of these areas.

I continue to believe that High Point Friends has tremendous potential both for the present and the future. Its potential is not only in its people but also in its present resources. I also believe that a faithful Quaker witness is very much needed not only in our world but in our community. There is a hunger for simplicity as well as community. There is a desire to see peace in our world as well as in our community. We are realizing that our society needs to continue to work towards equality at all levels, and we long for leaders and institutions to practice the kind of integrity that inspires trust in those they lead and serve. All of this is held together by a vision of stewardship in which we faithfully steward what has been given to us, not only by God, but by previous generations of faithful folks at High Point Friends Meeting.

All-Meeting Half-Day Retreat -2/3/24



World Relief Presentation - February 25

On Sunday, February 25th, Jonathan Musser, the Mission Services Director of World Relief Triad, will be with us during our 11AM hour to share about the important work World Relief is doing in the High Point and the Triad. He will share about their mission as well as the many service/volunteer opportunities available for folks that might be led to serve with them. In this most recent email to partnering organizations, Jonathan shared this update on their ongoing work:

2024 is off to a great start at World Relief Triad. This month alone we have welcomed 51 people from 10 different countries including: Pakistan, DRC, Myanmar, Afghanistan, Guatemala, Sudan, Syria, Eritrea, Rwanda, and Venezuela. With so many families arriving, we are working diligently to place families into permanent housing within 2 weeks after arrival and ensure that their new home is well stocked and furnished with items that communicate the love, care, and welcome of our community. With so many arrivals, we need your church's help in gathering some much needed household items. Will your church commit to doing at least one donation drive over the course of this calendar year? I've included a link below where your church can claim a specific date and collect items for World Relief (either in the days/weeks leading up to that date or on a specific Sunday you could ask your congregants to bring in certain items World Relief needs). Will you sign up below and help us welcome the stranger – for by welcoming them we welcome Christ! (Matt. 25:35, 45)"

We look forward to hearing how High Point Friends both can partner with World Relief.

Sharing Space With New Church Plant -

Beginning most likely in March, a new church plant (Immanuel High Point -<u>www.immanuelhighpoint.org</u>) will be sharing space with us on Sunday mornings. This is a church plant connected with the Presbyterian Church USA and they have been meeting in the YWCA. They have been looking for a new space and approached High Point Friends about the possibility of renting the chapel space on Sunday mornings. In our January Meeting for Business, it was approved to enter into an agreement with them in the amount of \$750 per month. They will be meeting at 11AM on Sunday mornings. We will continue to meet at 10AM for our meeting for worship. We feel this is a win/win for both congregations and we look forward to working with them as a partnering faith community in High Point.

What is "A Pounding"

An Old-Fashioned Pounding believed to originate in the 16th Century, and often accredited to the Quakers. It is thought to be called a 'pounding' due to the fact that most of the items – coffee, grain, flour, sugar, etc. – were sold by the pound.

An Old-Fashioned Pounding was a way to welcome a new minister to a church. The congregation would each bring an item to the minister's home and stay to visit for a bit.

This gave both the minister and the congregant an opportunity to get to know each other. In many churches, this practice is still continued today. One of our goals is Meeting. Meeting together and meeting the community needs.
