Let Us Then Try What Love Will Do

"A good end cannot sanctify evil means; nor must we ever do evil, that good may come of it... It is as great presumption to send our passions upon God's errands, as it is to palliate them with God's name... We are too ready to retaliate, rather than forgive, or gain by love and information. And yet we could hurt no man that we believe loves us. Let us then try what Love will do..."

(William Penn, 1693)

What often feels like the most uncomplicated part of life -and the spiritual journey — can often end up being the most challenging part. I'm talking about love and loving one another. We hear phrases like "love makes the world go round" and "all you need is love", but when it comes right down to it, it can feel like the most challenging part of life. I know that I need to love others. Often, I know that I'm supposed to love others. What I find difficult, though, is...well...loving others.

If I'm honest, it often starts with loving myself. That might seem counterintuitive, especially when it feels as if there is enough self-interest in our world go to around. But loving oneself is less about self-interest and more about cherishing ourselves in the same way that God cherishes us. It's accepting that I'm accepted. It's welcoming the reality that I am welcomed by God. It's loving myself unconditionally because God, well, loves me (and you) unconditionally. This is where love becomes more reality than theory. In theory, I know I am loved. In reality, though, I often try to measure up to people's expectations, or I keep ruminating over past mistakes and failures, or I get caught up in that unhealthy cycle of trying to please people, or I spend too much time wondering what others thinks about me, or...or... or...well, you get the idea.

The reality, the gospel reality, is that I am loved. The reality is that you are loved. The reality is that we are all loved, and there is nothing we can do (or have done) that can separate us from that love. In fact, to put it another way, God delights in us and is pleased with us. God smiles when God thinks of us. The best example I can come up with is the way I love our granddaughter, Maisie. We were just out in San Francisco spending a week with her and her parents, and I am still dwelling in that feeling of pure love. That pure love is her total acceptance of Lynda and I and our total acceptance of her. We love her just because she is. Maisie doesn't have to do anything, be anything, perform in any way, or prove anything. We simply love, and that is the purest kind of love that exists.

And it's that kind of love that we receive from God – a love that simply is, a love that we are immersed in daily. But this kind of love, when experienced, is not meant to be kept to ourselves. In his book, The Spirituality of Transformation, Joy, and Justice, author Patrick Saint-Jean writes, "Salvation comes from the gift of Divine love as it interweaves with the call to love, putting us on the path by which we grow into the people we were always intended to be, the healthiest and truest version of ourselves. We are each broken in some way – but at the same time we are unconditionally loved, accepted, and affirmed by the Source of all life. Love is the energy of the universe. When we open ourselves to love, it flows into each one of us, and then out into the world around us." And then he adds a few sentences later, "Love by its very nature cannot be hoarded; it has to be shared."

Maybe this is what the early Quaker, William Penn, meant when he wrote, "Let us then what Love will do..." Love is ultimately intended to be shared and offered to one another. It isn't meant to be hoarded or withheld. And maybe love ends up being more of a habit than we are willing to admit. In other words, the more we practice loving, the more we end up becoming loving people. The more we practice loving, the more it becomes a "holy habit" in which we love first rather than retaliate. As William Penn wrote, we are often too ready to retaliate than to forgive. Maybe, though, by daily practicing love and intentionally loving others, we will be more ready to forgive than to retaliate. And wouldn't that be the best kind of world to live in? A world in which love, forgiveness, reconciliation, acceptance, empathy, understanding, and compassion are our "go to" rather than everything that is the opposite of all of that.

I think Richard Rohr states it best when he wrote, "Why have we made things so complicated? Most of us were taught that God would love us if and when we change...In fact, God loves you so that you can change. What empowers change, what makes you desirous of change is the inner experience of love. This alone becomes the engine of positive change."

I agree, and I want to be part of that change. Let us then try what love will do.

Partnership Opportunities:

1. Donation Drive:

2. Home Set-up:

"Under Construction" at High Point Friends

Over the past few weeks, you may have seen some significant work being done in the grassy area surrounding the Columbarium. Over the past few years, we have had significant issues of water getting into the downstairs preschool area. A company out of Greensboro, Enduric, came out and helped us determine that drain line pipes underground had begun to deteriorate along with significant root balls from the trees invading the pipes. This was causing water to spill out from the drain lines, into the ground, and down into the downstairs area. The work that has been completed created a new drain line away from the building (Columbarium area) and routed it towards a storm drain near where the school buses are parked. They (Enduric) also installed a new drain below the external fire escape where rain water would always collect and pool against the building foundation. Our hope and intent is this will help to route water away from the meetinghouse and create better drainage. We are very appreciative to our High Point Friends Meeting Trustees for investing funds to help cover the costs of this major project.

Sharing Space With New Church Plant - Beginning March 3rd

Beginning March, 3rd a new church plant (Immanuel High Point - www.immanuelhighpoint.org) will be sharing space with us on Sunday mornings. This is a church plant connected with the Presbyterian Church USA and they have been meeting in the YWCA. They have been looking for a new space and approached High Point Friends about the possibility of renting the chapel space on Sunday mornings. In our January Meeting for Business, it was approved to enter into an agreement with them in the amount of \$750 per month. They will be meeting at 11AM on Sunday mornings. We will continue to meet at 10AM for our meeting for worship. We feel this is a win/win for both congregations and we look forward to working with them as a partnering faith community in High Point.
