October Highlights

World Quaker Day - Sunday, October 6

The first Sunday in October has become, over the last few years, World Quaker Day. This was started by the Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC), a Quaker organization that seeks to build bridges of understanding and community between Quaker groups all over the world. As part of this worldwide community of Quakers, we'll have our own "World Quaker Day" on that Sunday as we take time in our worship to connect and reconnect with our own Quaker spiritual journey as a community and individuals.

<u>Simple Carry-In Meal – Sunday, October 20</u>

You'll see in this newsletter our announcement about our Simple Carry-In on Sunday, October 20. This will be prior to our quarterly Meeting for Business. Our hope is two-fold: to encourage the deepening of our connection and community with one another and inviting participation in our ongoing Meeting Business. I hope you will be able to join us for the meal and, if possible, the Business Meeting. Both are very much a part of our life together as a Quaker faith community.



Stewardship Education and Outreach Engagement

Two areas that will be focusing on this Fall and inviting input from the congregation are stewardship and outreach. In the area of stewardship, we will be helping everyone become aware both of the financial needs of the meeting as well as ways you can partner with the meeting financially. We realize that folks are in different places financially, so our intention is simply to help you be aware of the meeting's needs as well as our stewardship goals, and let you make your own personal decision. In the area of outreach, we will be discerning what groups locally and globally we want to partner with long-term both financially and in presence. Outreach and generosity are an important part of our own values as High Point Friends Meeting, and we want to be strategic and intentional in our outreach partnership with other groups.

Participation in Worship

It's one of my intentions to invite more folks to be part of the worship leadership team on Sunday morning. This could include reading Scripture, offering a prayer, sharing about your own spiritual journey, and even offering your gift of music in song or through instrument. If this is something you would be willing to do, let me (Scott) know and I'll welcome your presence and sharing the Facing Bench with me! We want our meeting for worship to be a participatory experience and not a performance.



Finally, one of the areas I would like to give focus on over the next few weeks is that of community. What does it mean to be part of a faith community and how can we deepen our connection and relationships with one another. I believe everyone is seeking a place to belong and experience connection. This belonging and connection helps us to discover a sense of purpose as well as experience the power of relationships. We live in a very disconnected and isolated world where we are often only known for mailing address and maybe our political position. But do we know each other's story? Do we carry one another's burdens? Do we encourage one another? Are we intentional in caring for one another and checking on one another?

I appreciate how the Quaker, Mary Walton, puts it: "At some point in each of our spiritual journeys, a longing to find a faith and community that could speak to our condition brought us to a Quaker Meeting. Many Friends describe the experience of their first visit to Meeting as 'coming home.'. It is only with God's Spirit that such a diverse group of individuals an realize and embody the kind of unity, belonging, and community that answers to that of God within us."
