Clarity Over Certainty

In the early days of the pandemic, I was listening to a podcast on personal growth and leadership. Those early pandemic days were days of uncertainty. Considering that, the speaker, Patrick Lencioni, offered this advice – what you can't give, right now, to the folks you lead and to your organization is certainty. Nothing is for sure at this point. What you can offer the folks and organizations that you lead is clarity. In other words, even the best of leaders can't promise certain things will happen in an uncertain world, but what we can do is be as clear as possible within ourselves as to who we want to be and the values we want to live by in a world that sometimes feels chaotic and uncertain.

I'm reminded of the wonderful short book by Parker Palmer, Let Your Life Speak, when he writes about the different seasons of life. In describing the season of Winter, he writes, "...for me, winter has an even greater gift to give. It comes when the sky is clear, the sun is brilliant, the trees are bare, and the first snow is yet to come. It is the gift of utter clarity. In winter, one can walk into woods that had been opaque with summer growth only a few months earlier and see the trees clearly, singly and together, and see the ground they are rooted in." As I reflect on Parker Palmer's words, a few queries come to mind: What do you need to get clarity around regarding your own life's journey? What feels unclear to you? How can you let go of "certainty" and live more into "clarity"? How has the need for "certainty" become a barrier to you getting "clarity" for vour life?



As I think about and reflect on the year ahead for us as a Quaker faith community, I wonder about the areas we might need to get clarity around as High Point Friends Meeting -What are the areas we need to stretch ourselves and take risks? What does it look like for us to deepen our relationships and our practice of being in community together? What acts of service are we being called to offer our neighbors? What does it look like to pay attention to our own formation?

Someone once penned these words: "The goal of clarity is not to generate new information. The goal is transformation." As we seek clarity in our own life and for our meeting, it's less about cranking out and researching more information. Rather, it's more about the transformation of our own lives and High Point Friends towards living life faithfully and fruitfully. Getting clarity that leads us to transformation isn't just guess work. It involves listening - listening to God's Divine guidance, listening to one another, and listening to our own lives. It involves a willingness to experiment and take risks and realizing that failure can often be our best teacher. In those moments, we get clarity around what works and what doesn't and what next steps we need to take. Through this process, transformation takes place at a soul level, and clarity begins to form in our hearts.

In her much beloved poem, "The Summer Day", the late poet Mary Oliver admits that she really doesn't know how to pray (admitting her uncertainty) but that she is clear about one thing - that everything dies and often way too soon. At the close of her poem, she offers this most penetrating line in the form of a question: "Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?" That is a question that invites clarity – what is it each one of us plans to do with our one wild and precious life? What is it we plan to do with the one wild and precious life we hold together as High Point Friends Meeting? Reflecting on this question yields that kind of clarity that is transforming and keeps us from getting stuck in the idolatry of certainty.

When the opportunity arises, FUM also tries to provide power generators for the often experienced power outages.

Belize Friends School - Belize Friends School provides a second-chance education for at-risk youth in Belize City. The school offers a supportive Christian environment, helping students succeed through encouragement, social tools, and educational instruction. Along with the school, Belize Friends Ministries and Belize Friends Church offers a vital Quaker presence of making God's love real in the heart of Belize City.

<u>Center for Spiritual Deepening and Development</u> <u>High Point Friends Meeting</u>


A couple of months ago, I referred to the *Center for Spiritual Deepening and Development* as a new ministry being offered by High Point Friends Meeting. Realizing this may take some explanation, here is what this is all about. Over the last few years, a practice that has become increasingly important for my own spiritual journey and emotional wholeness has been that of contemplative silence, mindfulness, and the deepening of my own spiritual journey. It's my understanding and belief that our own spiritual journey is one that can be developed and deepened and that this process nurtures a deeper wholeness within us that affects how we show up in life. In other words, I can show up *responsively* or I can show up *reactively*. When we show up reactively, we are often reacting out of our own anxiousness, inward dividedness, and unawareness of our emotional woundedness. When we show up responsively, we do so in a way that is less reactive, more present to others, deepened empathy and compassion, and with a deeper sense of awareness of who we are, what we believe, and how we choose to respond.

Many of the practices that nurture this deepened and developing spiritual life are *silence*, *solitude*, *prayer*, *spiritual reading*, *scripture reading*, *slowing down*, *and pausing throughout the day*. These "practices" are designed and intended to help build habits into our life that deepened our awareness and develop our emotional wholeness as well as our own spiritual formation. To this end, the Center for Spiritual Deepening and Development will offer retreats, classes, workshops, and simple gatherings that invite participants to learn more about these types of practices as well as actually "practice the practices" towards deepening their own spiritual formation. All of this will be done with a desire to also introduce folks to many of our own Quaker practices that serve to deepen and develop our spiritual lives.

This has been a dream of mine since coming to High Point Friends mainly because our facility offers the kind of space that can be welcoming for people in the community to experience this kind of ministry. Our Haworth Chapel and Meeting Library are wonderful spaces of quiet, stillness, and peace. Our physical grounds are also wonderful outdoor spaces where folks can come and "retreat" from life and engage in these practices.

My hope is to slowly begin developing regular classes, retreats, and experiences to offer both to our own High Point Friends folks as well as other Quakers in the area. I also want to make this accessible to folks in the community that are seeking a deeper and more meaningful spiritual life and human journey. *If you would like to be part of this dream and help with making it a reality, please feel free to reach out to me and let me know. I want to make this a "High Point Friends Meeting" ministry and not just a "Scott project".*


