#### Breakfast Anyone?

Breakfast seems like one of those meals that's pretty good at any time. One of our favorite "go to meals" when we are either too tired to cook something or don't know what to cook is to have "Breakfast for Dinner" – whip up some eggs, put in some toast, maybe a little bacon, and you've got a perfect meal. I've been known to have an omelet for even a weekday lunch! And if there is anything I can cook at least halfway decent, it's the Breakfast Casserole that often shows up at the Wagoner house during Christmas and other special occasions.

This is why it does my heart good to remember that in the Gospels, one of the first things Jesus does after his resurrection is cook breakfast! In his Gospel, John tells us the story at the end of his Gospel where the disciples are fishing on the Sea of Tiberius after Jesus simply says, "I'm going fishing." The fishing doesn't go well at first until Jesus calls to them to cast their net on the other side. The disciples do so, and the number of fish is so great they can't haul in the net. It's at that moment that Peter realizes it's Jesus.

Peter jumps into the water and runs to the shore, leaving the other disciples to drag the net full of fish to shore. When they get to the shore, Jesus has already started a fire and is cooking fish along with some bread (even Jesus liked toast!)



Jesus invites the disciples to add some of their fish to the fire and then offers a simple invitation of "Come and have breakfast." Reflect on this for a moment. This is Jesus's third appearance since his death and resurrection – an experience beyond expectation and understanding – and his simple invitation is, "Breakfast anyone?"

I think John's narrative offers us a very valuable truth, and that is that the energy and possibility of new life can show up in the most ordinary of circumstances and events. In other words, the ordinary now becomes sacred, the routine now holds the possibility of resurrection life, our everyday existence has the potential wonder. In his Gospel, John doesn't have Jesus's appearance happening in great cathedrals or simple meetinghouses, although that is entirely possible. Rather, Jesus's appearances happen in an empty tomb, in a room full of fearful disciples behind closed doors, and on a beach around a fire cooking fish for breakfast. The ordinary is no longer so ordinary. The ordinary is now filled with wonder, possibility, hope, and the presence of the Living Christ.

As Quakers, we tend to keep things plain because of the very fact that we believe that the Living Christ is present in the very ordinary circumstances of life. Ornate cathedrals and elaborate worship ritual may offer beauty, but they are not the only containers of the resurrected Christ. The Living Christ is literally everywhere and can be experienced anywhere and often most likely in the most ordinary of moments and events of our life, even during breakfast!

And for that reason, on Easter Sunday (April 20) we're going to offer a "Simple Easter Breakfast" beginning at 8:45AM in Ragan Fellowship Hall. I'll be offering my Breakfast Casserole, and you're invited to bring whatever simple breakfast goodies you would like to add to the table. And with Jesus, I offer my simple invitation of "Come and have breakfast!"





<u>Intentional Prayer Wednesdays</u> - This is simply a day I invite each of us to give intention to pray for one another and the concerns for our world. We often open our Haworth Chapel from 10AM - 5PM for anyone that would like to use the space to sit and pray in the silence.

Other possibilities in the future include an occasional half-day retreat on a Saturday morning called *Unplug* in which we invite participants to literally "unplug" for a couple of hours and experienced a guided retreat around silence, worship, and experience deep quiet.
