The Best Kind of Witness

On my way to the meetinghouse this morning, I drove my regular route and standing on a corner at one of the major intersections was a fellow with a cordless microphone and portable speaker, and he was preaching to anyone who was driving slow enough or taking the corner slow enough to hear him. I could tell he was preaching since he had a bible in one hand and a small sign with a bible verse sticking out of the ground. I give the guy credit since it was a cold and damp morning, and it was also early. And I don't want to sound as if I am judging his intentions since, to be fair, if that's how he's led, then certainly he needs to be faithful to those leadings. But the question did rise to the surface in my mind – is this the best kind of witness? Is this the best way to proclaim the gospel and the good news? I couldn't hear him, and I was not sure anyone was able to slow down long enough to hear him. It all runs the risk of being more performative than transformative.

I began to wonder if the best kind of witness really shows up in the simple Quaker phrase, let your life speak. Quakers have often held this phrase close to their souls since it speaks to a way of witnessing that has the potential to be more transformative than performative. In other words, instead of just telling folks that God loves them, we make God's love real through our actions of generosity, giving, welcoming, and accepting. Instead of just telling folks that God has a wonderful plan for their life (an often-used phrase on evangelistic tracts), we come alongside folks and help them discern God's intentions and purpose for their life through being a listening presence and offering our own wisdom when it's helpful.



Instead of yelling and shouting about the injustices in the world, we show up in the places where we know there is injustice, and we offer our presence in solidarity with those who are oppressed as well as our influence to make sure that policies and laws treat others fairly and with dignity. There is a familiar quote that goes this way: "Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary, use words." Sometimes it's easy for words to become a substitute for action.

In this November issue of our newsletter, you will see a few ways in which we can let our lives speak. These ways involve presence, generosity, giving, and contributing in ways that help to lift others up. As a Quaker faith community, we offer these opportunities and needs and trust that you will listen to your soul and following God's leading and be faithful to those leadings. I always like to say that giving brings us much joy when it's done from a place of compassion rather than compulsion. In other words, we are going to trust that you will open your heart and soul to God's guiding grace and let your life speak from a place of compassion and not compulsion.

I don't know if I will see my friend on the corner preaching any time soon. If I do, I will pray and hope that his words can be heard and even received in a way that possibly transforms someone's life. In the meantime, I'm going to trust that letting our lives speak as individuals and High Point Friends will also produce fruit – the kind of fruit that will last. Because, in the end, it's all about *making God's love real*, which is exactly what God did when God came to us in the form of human love named Jesus.




Quaker Query/Advice of the Month

You will find flyers for both events in this newsletter.



FUM GENERAL BOARD ENACTS CHANGES AT FRIENDS UNITED MEETING – An update on the recent financial situation at FUM as reported in their recent FUM Enews

Over the past few weeks, the Financial Task Force, Finance Committee, Executive Board, and General Board of Friends United Meeting have each met to carefully review our current ministries, financial realities, and future directions. Together, these bodies have sought to steward FUM's resources faithfully while preparing FUM for a more sustainable future. Many Friends have also received a letter from the General Board, making Friends aware of FUM's concerning financial position and the difficult decisions that this reality has required. On Friday, October 24, 2025, the General Board met to receive and consider the Fiscal Year '26 budget for Friends United Meeting. The Board discerned that the pathway forward will require a period of restraint, creativity, and strategic restructuring. The following represents some of the significant changes that result from the approval of this budget.

PAUSE OF QUAKER LIFE MAGAZINE

After nearly seventy years of publication, the Board has made the difficult decision to pause future editions of Quaker Life. This decision was not made lightly but reflects current budgetary realities. FUM deeply appreciates our dedicated subscribers, and our office will be in contact with readers in the coming weeks regarding options related to this suspension. The General Board will also be discerning whether Quaker Life will fit into FUM's ongoing communications ministries as we seek more sustainable forms of storytelling and outreach.

STAFF REDUCTIONS AND TRANSITIONS

The FY26 budget also includes a reduction in staffing levels, one of the most difficult decisions by the board and administration. We are saddened to announce that Kathleen Wooten, our Web and Social Media Specialist, will no longer be employed with Friends United Meeting, effective December 1. This decision in no way reflects on the quality of her work or the depth of her dedication. Kathleen has served FUM with excellence, expanding our social media presence and strengthening our communications ministry. She will be greatly missed. Please hold our staff in your prayers as they navigate this period of transition with courage and grace.

DEEPER PARTNERSHIP WITH AFRICAN MEMBERS

The FY26 budget also reflects a \$2000 per month reduction in the funds sent to support FUM's African ministries office in Kisumu. This adjustment arises not only from budgetary necessity, but also from an emerging priority for African Friends to participate more fully in funding the shared budget of FUM. African Friends have been building fundraising capacity for some time, and this reduction is not an abrupt change in policy but a next step toward long-term global partnership.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

The FY26 budget also reflects FUM's deep commitment to completing outstanding audits and strengthening financial accountability procedures. We believe that this investment will serve Friends United Meeting well in the long run by ensuring greater transparency and better reporting for our board and members.

OTHER MEASURES

In addition, FUM has implemented a set of temporary measures to remain in effect until the financial position of Friends United Meeting becomes more stabilized. These measures include a pause on staff international travel, a freeze on new hires, and a temporary suspension of salary or compensation increases.

LOOKING FORWARD

This is a moment for renewed focus and faith. Even as we simplify and restructure, our calling remains clear: to build relationships of faith across cultures, to nurture spiritual leadership, and to extend the love of Christ through the ministries we share. The board continues to work on FUM's longer-term financial sustainability. A balanced budget for the current fiscal year will provide the necessary spaciousness for evaluation and discernment. In mid-November, we will host a budget presentation for the wider FUM community. The date and time of this virtual gathering will be announced soon through the FUM e-news. We ask for your ongoing prayers and partnership as we walk forward together, trusting that even in seasons of change, God's Spirit is preparing us for new growth.
